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Don't Get Swept Away

Surviving a Rip Current

With summer quickly approaching beachgoers will be packing Florida's beaches. Unfortunately, many beachgoers are unaware of the presence of rip currents, and worse, how to survive if they are caught in one.

A rip current is a narrow, fast-moving channel of water that starts near the beach and extends offshore through the line of breaking waves. Rip currents can occur at any beach with breaking waves.

The United States Lifesaving Association (USLA) estimates over 100 people in the United States are killed by rip currents each year. Rip currents account for over 80% of rescues performed by beach lifeguards.


If you get caught in a rip current, the best thing you can do is **stay calm**. It is not going to pull you underwater; it is just going to pull you away from shore.

The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) shares these tips on how to survive a rip current:

- Do NOT fight the current. It's a natural treadmill that travels an average speed of 1-2 feet per second, but has been measured as fast as 8 feet per second—faster than an Olympic swimmer.
- Relax and float to conserve energy. Staying calm may save your life.
- Do NOT try to swim directly into the shore. Swim parallel to the shoreline until you escape the current's pull. When free from the pull of the current, swim at an angle away from the current toward shore.
- If you feel you cannot reach shore, relax, face the shore, and call or wave for help. **Remember: If in doubt, don't go out!**

When you first get to the beach, the best thing you can do is swim in a guarded area. If you have questions about whether the conditions are hazardous or not, ask a lifeguard. Also, many beaches have a flag system or other forms of communication to be able to tell you if the conditions are hazardous.

Be aware of the Rip to help make your trip to the beach a safe and enjoyable one. ■

- ◆ If you can't escape, float or tread water
- ◆ If you need help, call or wave for assistance

- ◆ If in doubt, don't go out

Rear Facing Child Seats

Parents Often Flip Child Seat to Forward-Facing Too Soon

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reports that 59% of car seats are misused in a way that could reduce effectiveness. A 2011 C.S. Mott Children's Hospital National Poll on Children's Health reported that 73% of parents reported turning their child forward-facing before age 2.

The American Academy of Pediatrics suggests that all infants and toddlers **should ride in a rear-facing seat until they are at least 2-years-old or until they reach the highest weight or height allowed by their car safety seat manufacturer.**

When rear-facing, a child's back, neck and head are all supported by the car seat during an accident. Rear-facing car seats are five times safer than front-facing in a crash.

Drugged Driving Tops Drunk Driving

The Governors' Highway Safety Association and the Foundation for Advancing Alcohol Responsibility are reporting that **43 percent of fatally injured drivers with known test results tested positive for drugs**, while 38 percent tested positive for alcohol.

Drug impaired driving or drugged driving, whether a motorist is high or impaired on prescription medication, marijuana or opioids, is difficult to confirm because there are no roadside tests as there are for detecting drunk driving. Experts believe a standard test will be difficult since drugs have varying effects on users.

Surveys of regular marijuana users in Colorado and Washington state, where recreational use is legal, found that almost none of them thought marijuana use impaired their driving, while they believed drinking alcohol did.

The report recommends that states develop education campaigns, which can include discussing drugged driving in driver education classes, and informing physicians and pharmacists about the risks of driving on prescription drugs.

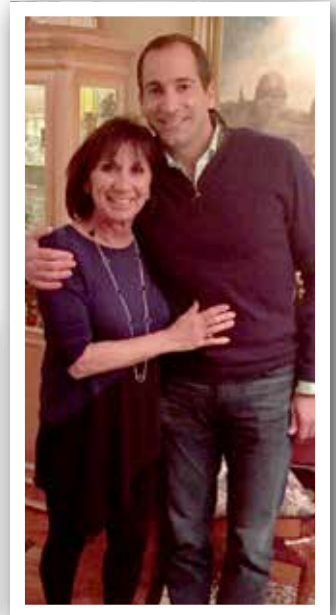
